Attendance

As is often the case at this time of year there has been a small number of children suffering from sickness. We feel that it is prudent to take this opportunity to remind parents/carers of the schools policy regarding sickness and diarrhoea:

If your child suffers from either sickness or diarrhoea there is a mandatory 48 hour period that they cannot attend school for after the sickness and or diarrhoea ends. This is to minimise the spread of infections.

To minimise the spread of infections we ask that parents encourage their children to practice good hygiene including regular and properly carried out hand washing before eating and after using the toilet.

Children can occasionally suffer from tummy ache that does not develop into sickness and we would encourage parents to send their child to school on these occasions if there are no other symptoms.
